Science – Year 9

Physics – our Year 9 students have been learning about motion and thinking about how distance-time and velocity-time graphs describe the story of a journey. We have also introduced the term acceleration and practiced our graph skills calculating gradients.

Chemistry – Students have been learning how to identify unknown substance through gas tests and chromatography. Students are now beginning to look at energy changes during reactions.

Biology – After the build-up to the end of year tests our Year 9s can finally refocus on learning new topics. This half term our pupils are learning about adaptations and feeding relationships in organisms. They will then move onto non-communicable diseases like heart disease and cancer and substances that can increase your risk of getting these diseases.

Geography – Year 9

Year 9 Geographers have been busy studying one of the world's global commons – Antarctica. They have been learning about the fact that whilst no one owns Antarctica we are all responsible for protecting the unique environment and answering the big question - Is Antarctica the last known wilderness?'

They have studied the location, climate, wildlife, resources and threats to Antarctica and have completed a decision taking activity on what the future for Antarctica should be. This really helped the to develop some great thinking skills which will help those of them studying Geography at KS4.

Technology – Year 9

Our Year 9 Design and Technology students have been diving deep into advanced skills this term—experimenting with food science, engineering, and decorative textile techniques. With a focus on precision, creativity, and real-world application, students are producing high-quality work across all three D&T strands.

Food Preparation: Sensory Tasting and the Science of Sugar In Food Prep, Year 9 students have been investigating the fascinating world of sensory analysis—learning how we experience flavour, texture, and appearance in food. A key focus has been on different types of sugar and how they affect the overall quality of food products.

✓ Comparing results using caster, brown, demerara and icing sugar
✓ Using sensory tasting techniques to evaluate products fairly and accurately
By combining theory with practical cooking, students have been gaining a scientific understanding of ingredients while honing their palates.

🐁 Resistant Materials: Engineering Desk Lamps

In Resistant Materials, students are taking a more technical, hands-on approach as they work on metal stem components for their desk lamp project. This stage of the project involves shaping, joining, and refining materials to create strong, functional structures.

 \checkmark Bending and shaping metal to fit design specifications

The desk lamps are coming together brilliantly, combining form and function in a way that reflects real engineering practice.

Textiles: Upcycled Denim Cushions with a Creative Twist

Year 9 students in Textiles are showing off their creativity and craftsmanship through their upcycled patchwork denim cushions. Using reclaimed denim and personal design choices, students are adding decorative techniques to make each cushion unique and meaningful.

Business & ICT – Year 9

This term in ICT, Year 9 students have been learning about **Cybersecurity** exploring how to stay safe online, protect personal data, and understand common digital threats.

They had time in lesson to look at live cyber threats and engage in discussions on what to look out for when using technology today

They are also currently completing an exciting unit on **Physical Programming**, using Micro:bits, our Botleys and other types of other programming tasks to bring code to life through hands-on tasks. This will introduce them to real-world applications of programming and helped build key problem-solving skills.

History – Year 9

This term, students have been learning about how and why the Holocaust happened. Through careful source analysis, students have examined key events such as the rise of the Nazi regime, anti-Jewish laws, and the escalation of persecution that led to the Final Solution. They have explored survivor testimonies, propaganda, and other historical evidence to better understand the experiences of victims and the motivations of perpetrators.

More recently, students have explored how minorities have been treated in the UK since 1945. They have investigated the experiences of different communities, including the Windrush generation and LGBTQ+ people, considering both the challenges they faced and the contributions they made to British society. Students have used a range of sources including videos, personal accounts, and government documents to inform their learning and discussions.

Music – Year 9

This term, students have been exploring the world of covers and arrangements.

They began by learning the difference between a cover and an arrangement, followed by analysing well-known songs to understand how artists reinterpret music in creative ways. Students then applied their knowledge by creating their own cover versions of a chosen piece using keyboards.



In the second half of the term, we introduced music technology into the mix.

Using Digital Audio Workstations (DAWs) and loops, students have started building their own digital arrangements, blending performance and production skills. It's been a fantastic term of creativity, innovation, and musical growth!

Drama & Dance – Year 9

In this final term, Drama students have been focusing on dance and physicality in storytelling, exploring how movement can be used to communicate meaning without words.

As part of this unit, they have studied the powerful professional work **'Swansong'** by renowned choreographer **Christopher Bruce**.

Through this exploration, students have developed their choreographic skills and deepened their understanding of physical theatre, using the body as a tool for expression. They have applied interpretive and analytical skills to create their own responses to key sections of the piece, incorporating a chair in inventive ways and experimenting with a range of choreographic devices.

This unit has offered an exciting and thoughtprovoking way to end the year, blending creativity with physical precision.

Similarly, Ruby who is new to Hessle High, has thoroughly engaged with the task and created a believable narrative and character through using a range of physical skills such as facial expression, gesture, space and dynamics.
